What is the meaning behind Memorial Day?

In 1868, Memorial Day was officially designated as a day to honor those fallen in service to their country during the Civil War.

According to the Library of Congress, three years after the end of the war, John A. Logan, Commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, set aside May 30 for "Soldiers' Memorial Day."

Intended to remember Union and Confederate soldiers who died in the conflict, Logan decreed that the day should be for "strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village, and hamlet churchyard in the land."

Over time, the Memorial Day holiday was expanded to include fallen soldiers from all American wars. In 1971, Congress declared it a national holiday, changing the observance from May 30 to the last Monday in May.

The annual holiday is also referred to as "Decoration Day" in recognition of the flowers, flags and other adornments that decorate the graves of fallen military persons.

How is Memorial Day commemorated?

Each year, many communities across the U.S. hold parades or ceremonies to recognize veterans, active service members and other military personnel.

It's also a day for friends and family to visit the gravesites of loved ones to leave flowers or other mementos in their memory.

To pay tribute to fallen servicemen and women, a wreath is placed on the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in an annual ceremony held at Arlington Cemetery in Arlington, Virginia on Memorial Day.

In 2000, Congress signed the "The National Moment of Remembrance Act" into law. From that point forward, citizens were encouraged to pause for a moment of silence to remember those who've died in service to our country at 3 p.m. local time each and every Memorial Day.

If you plan to fly a flag on Memorial Day, it should be flown at half-staff from sunrise to noon, then it should be briskly raised to the top of the staff until sunset.

2024 MCARE OFFICERS ELECTION

Every even-numbered year, there is an MCARE membership election for MCARE's Officers (President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Sgt. at Arms) who hold office for two-year terms. In the odd years, we elect the At Large Directors to ensure that we have continuity among the Board of Directors and to avoid a complete turnover of positions and the risk of losing historical wisdom.

MCARE is seeking members who wish to run for positions in the upcoming elections. MCARE currently has incumbent members in the positions of President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer who expressed a desire to run as candidates this November, however the current Sgt. at Arms position is vacant.

Anyone may run for any position that interests them; the more involvement and ideas, the stronger the association.

Here is our timeline for the upcoming election:

- Nominations for Officers open on August 1 and close on September 15.
- Membership voting for Officers will be conducted electronically and with mail-in ballots, commencing on October 1.

Heart Attack vs. Cardiac Arrest: What's the Difference?

The two are often mistaken for one another, but causes, warning signs and treatments can differ By Rachel Nania | Published April 22, 2024

Cardiac arrest

What is cardiac arrest? Cardiac arrest is when the heart suddenly stops pumping, depriving the body and brain of oxygen-rich blood.

The impact is immediate: Breathing stops and the person loses consciousness. "If somebody has a cardiac arrest, it's not subtle. They are on the ground, and they are not responding to you," says Gregory Katz, M.D., a cardiologist at NYU Langone and an assistant professor in the Department of Medicine at NYU Grossman School of Medicine.

What causes cardiac arrest? Cardiac arrest is caused by irregular heart rhythms, called arrhythmias, that cause the heart to stop working properly, says the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute (NHLBI).

Many health conditions that are common among older adults can disrupt the heart's rhythm and increase the risk of cardiac arrest, including coronary heart disease, a prior heart attack, atrial fibrillation, heart inflammation, cardiomyopathy (an enlarged heart), and leaky or narrow heart valves. Still, the NHLBI says about half of cardiac arrests happen to people who did not know they had a heart problem.

Sometimes heavy alcohol use or drug use can trigger cardiac arrest. So can severe stress, a blow to the chest (this is what recently happened to NFL player Damar Hamlin) and respiratory arrest, or when a person stops breathing.

Are there warning signs and symptoms of cardiac arrest?

Unlike many other health issues, there aren't usually any signs or symptoms to warn an individual that cardiac arrest is imminent, though some people may experience chest pain, nausea, vomiting or shortness of breath before losing consciousness. "People may get no warning whatsoever," Katz says.

What should you do? If you see someone in cardiac arrest, "the immediate thing that you do is you start chest compressions, and you call 9-1-1," Katz says. Starting CPR — which helps keep blood flow active until emergency responders arrive — "really is the difference between somebody having a good outcome versus a tragic outcome," he says. About 350,000 people die from cardiac arrest every year in the U.S., and less than half of people who experience cardiac arrest outside the hospital receive the right care from bystanders.

The American Heart Association says anyone can perform CPR with hands-only chest compressions (no need for mouth-to-mouth unless you're trained and feel comfortable doing it). Push hard and fast in the center of the chest to the beat of "Stayin' Alive" by the Bee Gees or another song that is equivalent to about 100 to 120 beats per minute. And if an automated external defibrillator (AED) is available, use it. These portable devices that can often be found in public places such as airports and malls can stimulate the heart to resume beating.

Heart attack

What is a heart attack? Unlike with cardiac arrest, the heart is still pumping when a person has a heart attack; it's just that the heart is under stress, says Mistyann-Blue Miller, M.D., a cardiologist with Cleveland Clinic in Vero Beach, Florida. And that's because blood flow to the heart is being blocked. If this blood flow is not restored quickly, the oxygen-starved heart muscle will start to die.

What causes a heart attack? Most heart attacks are caused by coronary artery disease, according to the NHLBI, or plaque buildup along the walls of the arteries that supply blood to the heart. Cholesterol and other fatty substances can lead to this buildup.

A number of modifiable factors can increase your risk for coronary artery disease, including physical inactivity, unhealthy eating, smoking and being overweight, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Other risk factors include a family history of heart disease.

Are there warning signs or symptoms of a heart attack? Also different from cardiac arrest is that many people who have a heart attack experience symptoms. For some, they can start slowly and be mild. For others, symptoms can come on suddenly and be severe.

"I describe it to patients that it can be anything weird between your chin and your belly button," Katz says. And those odd or uncomfortable feelings typically gets worse with physical activity. "The idea that everyone has an elephant sitting on their chest as their heart attack symptom is just not borne out in the real world," he adds.

Heart attack symptoms can include:

- · Chest pain or discomfort
- Pain or discomfort in the arms, back, shoulders, neck, jaw and stomach (above the belly button)
- · Shortness of breath
- Sweating
- Fatigue
- Nausea and vomiting
- · Lightheadedness or dizziness
- Rapid or irregular heartbeat

Women tend to have more "nonspecific" heart attack symptoms that are easier to attribute to other things, such as stress, Miller says. "That can be a dull, achy feeling between the shoulder blades, maybe fatigue, decreased exercise tolerance," she explains. "If something doesn't feel right, definitely report that to your doctor."

Katz says older adults are also less likely to experience the classic heart attack symptoms.

What should you do? If you suspect a heart attack, call 9-1-1 right away. CPR isn't necessary unless the person isn't breathing or you can't find a pulse. "You really need to go to an emergency room," Katz says, where doctors can quickly locate and address the blockage. The longer the heart goes without oxygen, the more likely a person is to experience permanent damage, even death.


Our flight from Rome gently descended over the Tyrrhenian Sea to land at Palermo's Falcone e Borsellino Airport.

We were collected by a tour company driver and sat back for about an hour as our van wound its way through heavy Saturday afternoon traffic to Hotel Federico II in central Palermo, the capital and largest city of the semi autonomous island province, where we joined other members of our small group of new friends and tour leader Davide Di Salvo. After check-in, Davide walked several of us around the nearby commercial neighborhood to locate restaurants, stores, ATMs and pharmacies, before letting us settle in with our own evening choices.


Sunday started with a morning walk in the narrow streets of the old town, first passing the huge 19th century Teatro Massimo, one of the most prominent in Europe, with local guide Laura. As we strolled, she educated us on Sicily's history, including its domination through the centuries by a series of invaders, among them Phoenicians, Carthaginians, Greeks, Romans, Normans and French, all having left

their imprints in culture, religion and architecture in this crossroad of the central Mediterranean. We saw lasting results of the most recent invasion. During World War II, Allied bombers and troops took the island in 1943, driving out German forces and leaving a number of buildings still in their bombed out condition.



scooters, with savory aromas wafting throughout. We finished the tour with a visit to Opera dei Pupi, the only continuously operating puppet show in Italy, dating from the early 19th century. Rather than a full show, we were given a personalized demonstration by puppeteer Giovanni,



and invited members of our group to try puppeteering.



Lesson in puppeteering

Lunchtime brought a chance to try arancini, a favored informal and inexpensive handheld fried rice ball, stuffed with a variety of veggies, meats and cheeses and available in numerous small shops. We had ours under a streetside umbrella providing just enough cover from a cool drizzle. Mine was filled with ground beef and Jean's had chicken with curry and carrots — each quite tasty and filling.

When someone mentions Sicily, people often still immediately – and sadly – think of the Mafia. It's understandable, as organized crime has (cont'd on page 10)

created a great deal of human suffering in Sicily, as well as in the United States. To help expand people's knowledge and perspective, our group attended a presentation in the afternoon by two middle age men whose families' lives were, in different ways, deeply affected. Their fathers grew up as neighbors in Corleone, considered the epicenter of the Sicilian Mafia; or as called by some "La Cosa Nostra" or "our thing". One man's father became a tailor and was pressed into service for local mafia bigwigs. He eventually feared for his family's safety and moved off the island and away from Italy with them for years until convinced it was safe to return. The other man's father eventually became a prominent mafia boss in Sicily, and his family went into hiding until his capture. The sins of that father were – and are – visited upon that son, as he grew up on the island as part of a fugitive family, and now has difficulty finding work or creating a business, some two decades later.

The decline of the mafia in Sicily was precipitated by its own terrible actions, culminating in the separate assassinations in 1992 of two investigating judges – Giovanni Falcone and Paolo Borsellino. The murders were so publicly callous, including the deaths of bystanders, that they galvanized the resistance of the populace and vigor of the state to reduce the influence of organized crime. The international airport in Palermo is now named after the martyred judges; and their faces are prominently displayed as heroes around the island, which is also dotted by billboards and other signs proclaiming "no mafia". Though organized crime, whether in Sicily or anywhere else in the world is never eradicated, its prominence in Sicily is now greatly reduced and the island feels quite safe.

After that serious presentation, it was time for something completely different. Group members were collected by twos in a convoy of tuk-tuk three wheel scooters driven by wannabe Formula One race car drivers, to careen through narrow streets and alleys of the old town, missing pedestrians, vehicles, buildings and café furniture by inches, bouncing along uneven surfaces, while we made sure to keep our elbows in.

Energized by that, the group was eventually delivered to Locale restaurant for a fine dinner, and an easy amble back to the hotel.

A winding hour and a half bus ride the next cool Spring morning led to the charming village of Castelbuono, in the Madonie Mountains. We were met at the village entrance by two garbage collectors and their uniquely tasked donkeys, slightly famous for their ability to navigate the narrow lanes of the village to collect recycling materials from color coded small containers sometimes lowered from upper floor homes by residents. We followed one of them and its handler as they efficiently went about their work. That stroll led to a primary village attraction, the 14th century hilltop castle and church offering distant countryside views, and now functioning as a combination museum, gallery and performance space.

The village is reinventing itself as a center of gastronomy, tourism and shopping, with inns, boutiques and fine food selections lining its narrow main street. Anchoring the town square of Piazza Margherita is Panettone Fiasconaro, founded in 1953 by Mario Fiasconaro and thriving today still as a family run business. Panettone is a delicious pastry with countless recipes — many of which are available online - and unique in its use of manna, the sweet white sap from local ash trees, to make creamy filling. The tasty samples we were provided seduced several of the group into purchases to enjoy and to take home.


Our appetites whetted, we continued to Michelin starred Ristorante Nangalarruni, one of thirty some dining establishments in the village. Our excellent multi course lunch included fresh ingredients and fungi based pasta; and was augmented by lively traditional music played by talented locals on guitar and accordion, and sung in full voice. Two little girls were drawn in as if by magnets from an adjacent dining room to dance along.

We left Palermo the next morning, venturing first to the nearby hill town of Monreale, which overlooks Palermo and a fertile, productive valley, with splendid views to the sea. We met an extremely knowledgeable local guide who led us through the magnificent Cattedrale di Santa Maria, which dominates the town. Of byzantine and Norman architecture, it is one of Italy's national monuments, displaying thousands of elaborate gold mosaics, dating to its construction around 1200 AD. We had just enough time for a cappuccino from a café on the piazza; and to succumb to one souvenir purchase on the way back to the bus.

An incredibly scenic drive over about an hour – the last leg up a narrow winding gravel lane in an ancient van – led to the bucolic Agriturismo Tenute Pispisa, high atop a valley filled with vineyards, wildflowers and orchards. The welcoming committee of two large friendly dogs managed to quietly wag their tails while reclining in the shade of the front porch. Inside, a sumptuous multi course lunch was complimented by fine wines whose grapes were harvested from the vines just beyond the airy light filled

dining room. After lunch, we ambled down the

same lane, savoring a long distance view of the unfinished and still stunning Doric Temple of Segesta, from the fifth century BC, built by Greeks when Segesta was an important regional town.

The day's final destination was the southwest coastal city of Mazara del Vallo and our seaside Mahara Hotel. The waterfront promenade invited us to stretch our legs, and the fresh late afternoon sea breeze was a bonus. A delicious pizza at a waterfront restaurant, and an easy walk back to the hotel capped the day.

Our next morning began with a walking tour led by local guide – retired banker and sometime nightclub singer Antonio, who educated us on the city's history – settled by Phoenicians in the ninth century BC, then controlled in various intervals like so many parts of the central Mediterranean by Greeks, Romans and others until being settled by Arabs in 827 AD, whose control lasted until 1072 AD and the conquest of the area by Normans. The center of the old city became the Kasbah, and Mazara is still considered the most Arab city in Italy, with a vibrant population of Tunisian ancestry, mostly residing in the old town. Arab architectural influence is spread mostly over the narrow winding lanes of the Kasbah; and Norman influence is seen in the ruins of a fort and in some churches.

The walking tour ended with a gourmet lunch on the patio of the home of Antonio and his wife Vita, featuring homemade delights made from the olive and lemon trees of their garden; finishing with an exquisite dessert of granitas, frozen lemon ice with strawberries.

Our final day in western Sicily began with a ride along the coast to a salt museum and pans, where we learned of the process of harvesting salt from the sea, largely unchanged from ancient times to the present. We left with small jars of crunchy, flavorful salt much more interesting than what is found on supermarket shelves. (cont'd on page 12)

We then took a short, small boat ride over very shallow waters to the island of Mothya, settled by Phoenicians some 2,700 years ago. We walked among ancient walls of their forts and port and could see in the shallow water remnants of an ancient stone causeway to nearby Marsala.

We finished the day with the fun of a cooking lesson led by the entertaining Chef Paolo at La Vela Ristorante. Our group was separated into subgroups, focusing on Pasta Alla Norma, red pesto sauce using red garlic, eggplant parmigiana, and sponge cake parfait for dessert. Our amateur efforts were deemed successful by the chef, and delicious by all of us as we enjoyed the fruits of our efforts for dinner. And yes, there was wine.
